Following on from the 'Rags to Riches' walking tour of St Kilda, Heritage Victoria has a new walking tour 'Melbourne at War: Hidden Histories'. It has ten stops. Starting with Government House, moving to Victoria Barrack, you then wander down past Flinders Street Station and on to Speakers Corner. From here you pass Parliament House and go down Collins Street, where The Age and The Argus had offices. Down to the Town Hall and then

Melbourne Hospital's original site in Lonsdale Street. Heading to the Exhibition Buildings along Russell Street learn why it was known as 'Red' Russell Street.

It is probably no surprise as to why some locations were chosen, but some aspects of how the buildings or locations were used during the war may be a surprise.

This scenario arises when it is beneficial to use a previous edition of the index, e.g. for an annual report or a text where the changes are relatively minor, rather than reindexing the whole work from scratch. IndexConvert, created by UK indexer Barry Campbell, will be demonstrated, to show how well it works.</p>
